



Checklist for church properties to reduce the risk of an arson attack

Arson poses a significant threat to your church and church hall. It is the most common cause of large fire losses and a major security challenge for church communities and churches are often viewed as a soft target.

The following checklist will help you review the arson risk and guide you through simple steps to reduce the risk of becoming a victim of arson.

- Have you reviewed your church security arrangements? Are adequate measures in place to protect vulnerable areas against unauthorised access?
- Have you spoken to your neighbours? Encourage people living near the church to be vigilant and report any suspicious activity immediately to the Police.
- Good housekeeping is vital -
 - Do not accumulate rubbish and combustible waste in or around the church.
 - Candles and matches should be locked away.
 - Do not leave petrol in the church.
 - Do not leave bales of hay/straw for the Christmas crib in the church all year.
 - Boiler houses should be locked with no combustible waste stored in them.
- Are your bins close to the church or church buildings? Locate bins in secure areas well away from buildings if possible. A fire in a waste bin close to the church can quickly spread to the building.
- Do you carry out repairs quickly if you suffer from graffiti or malicious damage attacks? Minor damage is often followed by more serious incidents including arson if not addressed quickly.

- Is your church securely locked overnight?
Make sure the church is locked overnight including any perimeter gates. Arson risks significantly increase during the hours of darkness.
- Church halls should be locked when not in use.
- Are doors and accessible windows adequately secured to prevent unauthorised access?
- Have you limited authorised entry points, other than for services?
Leave only one door unlocked during the day. This should be easily visible from nearby properties.
- Create the impression the building is visited regularly. Encourage members of the church and neighbours to visit as part of their daily routine.
- Use the church as much as possible. If practical have a rota of church sitters.
- Keep internal doors closed to prevent fire spreading.
- Have you considered installing external security lighting and intruder alarms, or closed circuit television to help deter criminals?
Fire and intruder alarms should be remote signalling to a receiving centre to ensure a 24 hour response to any activations to help mitigate losses as far as possible.
- Make sure fire extinguishers are maintained annually and church officials have been trained in their use.
